

 - **Steps to make a book donation:**
 - a. Select your chosen title(s) from our list.
 - b. Select the quantity you would like to donate.
 - c. Add your selections to your cart.
 - d. If prompted, log into your own Amazon account.
 - e. Proceed to check out.
 - f. When prompted to *Choose Your Shipping Address*, be sure to select *Kelly Hersh's Gift Registry Address* so the books will be shipped directly to DenCoKID for distribution.
 - g. When prompted to *Choose Gift Options*, feel free to include a short message and your name.
 - h. Proceed with your payment and shipping preferences.
